Meet Mary Bauer of St. Martha Parish





In my last letter, I began by acknowledging that much information about the creation of the Family of Parishes model that the Diocese is adopting has been relatively slow in coming. I mentioned that this was mostly done on purpose by me as I was hesitant to release news prematurely. There was still a lot that was in flux, and I did not want to make an announcement only to have to retract it a few months or even weeks later. As we enter our second year as a Family, I believe my reluctance has been well served. It is only recently that more clarity has been given to the future structure of priestly ministry, and I will try now to explain the new reality. Many have noticed that while many priests were named as Pastor of the new Families being created, I was announced as Moderator.

There is a key difference in Canon Law. Canon 517 states, "When circumstances require it, the pastoral care of a parish or of several parishes together can be entrusted to a team of several *priests in solidum* with the requirement, however, that one of them should be the moderator in exercising pastoral care, that is, he should direct their combined activity and answer for it to the bishop." This is the model under which we are operating. I am the Moderator of our Family and am one of three Priests *In Solidum* given authority over all 6 of our Parishes. Father Bart Lipiec and Father Lukasz Kopala join with me as the three Priests *In Solidum* for the Beloved Disciples of Christ the Lord.

We, three share in the pastoral care of the entire Family. As Canon 543 states, "Each of the priests who as a team have been entrusted with the pastoral care of some parish or group of different parishes is obliged to perform the duties and functions of the pastor...in accord with an arrangement determined by themselves; ... to be

exercised however, under the direction of the moderator." As a result, none of us now has the title of "Pastor" and we will stop using that title. We are three Parish Priests *In Solidum*, in a team ministry arrangement, with myself serving as Moderator, the one who answers to the Bishop.

In addition, when the Family was first being formed, we were told there would be four priests in total assigned to the 6 Parishes. We were blessed when it was decided that Father Paul Steller would continue to live at St. Mary's on the Hill and minister to the Parish as he retired. Fr. Paul has been a blessing for us as he has continued to serve St. Mary's in multiple ways. In effect, we have had 5 priests ministering to our Family. Now as the shortage of priests begins to have a greater impact, we have been informed that our sole Parochial Vicar, Father Aaron Kulczyk, who has worked tirelessly this past year, mostly at Our Lady of Pompeii and St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta, has been transferred. We thank Fr. Aaron for the diligence and energy he has demonstrated the past 12 months. He will be missed.

In essence, our Family going forward will be served by 4 priests, Fr. Bart, Fr. Lukasz and myself as Parish Priests In Solidum and Fr. Paul in retirement. That withdrawal of one priest will have a great impact on our plans as we will have to look at all our Parish offerings once again and will be forced to make adjustments. We will continue to work with the Family Council and the lay leadership of each Parish Community in planning these modifications. St. Pope John Paul II often quoted Jesus' frequent words of counsel, "Do not be afraid." I hope we

can heed these words as together we move forward to face a challenging, but hope-filled future. Peace,

In the 1950s and 1960s, the areas of Cheektowaga, Lancaster, and Depew were greatly expanding and the need for new Catholic Churches and schools arose. The new residents and now Parishioners of newly formed Parishes began to build up these new places of worship.

St. Barnabas Parish was established on June 13, 1960 at the corner of Dick Rd. and George Urban Blvd. The Parishioners spent their first year moving around between the Aero Drive-In Theatre, a "Chapel-on-Wheels," and even an airport hangar. The first Mass that was celebrated on campus in the new large hall was on November 12th of 1961. It was not until 1967 that the new Church and school buildings were open and in use.

Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament (OLBS) Parish was established on July 15, 1965 under Pastor Msgr. Joseph Coughlin just down the road from St. Barnabas at George Urban Blvd. and French Rd. The first Parish Mass was held at St. Mary's High School on August 1, 1965. From 1983-1990, the Parish expanded and a new gym was added, along with some Church remodeling. In 1989, the original convent was converted into the present-day Rectory. Assisted by the Felician Sisters, OLBS was able to open a school for grades 1-3 shortly after beginning as a Parish. In 1977, a kindergarten was added. OLBS School is still a lively and growing school today. Look to the next page for an update on their progress and preparations for the next school year.



Both Parishes continued to thrive through the 1990s, but as times changed, job opportunities moved people from the area and families grew smaller, so the need for two Parishes this close together dwindled. In 2005, during the Diocesan "Journey of Faith & Grace," Parishes evaluated themselves and made recommendations as to what the future directions should be. As a result, it was decided that St. Barnabas and OLBS would merge. Though the process was difficult and took hard work, collaboration, and a lot of prayer, the newly merged St. Martha Parish began their work on June 12, 2011 at the OLBS site. A shining example of how working together can help the Parish community grow, this Parish continues to head towards a bright future, while continually honoring both pasts.

When asking Fr. Bart for a Parishioner to interview, it seemed too easy for him to come up with a name and after meeting her, there is no doubt why. On a rainy evening in June, Mary Bauer and her family gathered for some portraits. After sharing some stories, it was simple to see the love and Faith that is shared.

Mary is the youngest of three children and the only girl. Both she and her husband, Don, attended St. Ann's Elementary School where they met in kindergarten and especially enjoyed roller skating at the school super rink. As the years passed, they grew together and eventually married in 1965. They were blessed with two children, Michael and Jill and three grandchildren, Shawn, Luke, and Allison.

Mary graduated from Erie Community College and became a Dental Hygienist, a profession she practiced for 35 years and truly loved. Some may know her from a Dentist's office at Delaware and West Utica or her part-time work when she moved to a Lancaster office. Don graduated as a Mechanical Engineer and worked for both Buffalo Tool & Die for many years, as well as Houdaille Hydraulics, later named Vibratech, where he retired from in 2001. After retirement especially, Don took an active interest in photography. A love he shared with all his family.

Mary and Don have been active members of St. Martha Parish for 56 years. Mary has been a part of many ministries and organizations over the years. These include the Altar & Rosary Guild, as a Eucharistic Minister to the homebound, working in the Food Pantry, and as a weekly collection counter. Parishioners around St. Martha's know her most from her work on the Worship Committee, specifically because she is responsible for the decorating of the altar and Church for special Masses and liturgical seasons. "I am so fortunate to have a co-worker and friend, Linda, to help me. Together we do an exceptional amount of decorating. Our work is very involved, but it is so gratifying to beautify our altar."

Don was also very involved in service to the Parish as an Altar Server for Funerals, Eucharistic Minister, member of the Holy Name Society, and a frequent Eucharistic Adorer. Most notably, he was a member of the Sanctuary Renovation Committee for St. Martha's, but unfortunately never saw the completion of the project. In 2012, Don was diagnosed with cancer and after a twoand-a-half-year battle, passed away.

"Becoming a widow at 70 years of age, I had to face many unknown challenges. My faith and trust in God helped me to accept the challenges and continue to move forward, knowing God is at my side."

Another test of her faith came in 2017 when she herself was diagnosed with cancer. Through her surgery and treatments, she prayed the rosary and special prayers for healing. After six months, she was blessed, fortunate, and healthy enough to join her fellow Parishioners on a pilgrimage trip to Rome. After all her challenges, she has developed a strong devotion to the Blessed Mother, still praying the rosary daily, which she credits as giving her a level of comfort and strength to face each new day.

As our time together drew to a close, she was asked if there was a parting message she had for her fellow BDCL Family Members. Her immediate reply?

"Be kind and care for one another and pray for world peace!"







<u>Roles at Mass</u>

We are all familiar with seeing and understanding who a Priest and Deacon are when it comes to the Mass, but sometimes it can be difficult to understand how those not ordained can take a special role in assisting with the Mass.



Other lesser known or seen roles that assist in making a Mass special include:

Sacristan: Someone who assists in preparing the altar for Mass or cleaning the altar and vessels used during Mass afterwards.

<u>Altar Linens</u>: Some of the linen used during Mass needs to be laundered in a specific way to respect that Jesus is still present. There are volunteers who are aware of these special rules that help clean the linens.

Decorations & Liturgy Committee: A group of people who help make sure special Masses and liturgical seasons stand out and reflect the special times of the year.

Cleaning: Often there are groups of volunteers that assist in keeping the Sanctuary or even whole Church clean.

Jesus realizes his promise to be with the Church in many ways, but most of all through the celebration of the Mass as a memorial of the death and resurrection of the Lord, and more specifically in the celebration of the Eucharist.

According to the Synod of Bishops in Rome in October of 2005, the Eucharist is the "source and summit" of the life and mission of the Church. It lies at the heart of the whole life of the Church.

As Catholics, we recognize the "Real Presence" of the Lord in the Eucharist, but what does that mean?

A term coined by Pope Paul VI in his encyclical, *Mysterium Fidei* (1965) he explained it as, "the substantial presence by which Christ is made present without doubt, whole and entire, God and man (no. 39)."

Through this transformation, brought forth by the Holy Spirit during consecration, "Christ's body and blood become really present and are really given", so that we may be united with Christ himself. (Catholic Bishop's Conferences of England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland, One Bread One Body, 1998; nos. 50 & 51) The transformation is a mysterious one, and we know little about it except that it cannot be grasped with our senses. The closest description that we can produce is the use of the term transubstantiation. Though far from a precise explanation of what happens during the consecration, it is our way of describing the mysterious transformation of the inner reality of bread and wine into the Great Mystery of the inner reality of the body and blood of the risen Lord.

For many today, reality is related to the physical - what can be grasped and tested and proved by our senses. As Christians, we understand that there is more to reality than the physical. There is something beyond our senses that can only be understood through as Pope Paul VI called it, "the mystery of faith" (*Mysterium Fidei*, no. 51). We look at the substance of the bread and wine not in the material sense, but in referring to the inner reality which reaches beyond what we can see and touch.

Through the Sacraments, Jesus takes our visible actions and items and uses them as symbols of his saving action and grace. They are not meant to be between us, but to act as direct points of contact for us to him. In the Eucharist, Christ himself is directly present and available to us through the physical elements of bread and wine. These are our direct points of contact with the inner reality of the crucified, risen, and glorified Jesus Christ, immediately present to us under the sacramental symbols of the totally transformed bread and wine.

This connection is there as an invitation to share our lives with him. We are called to welcome and accept him with an open heart and living faith so that his presence can flourish in us. It brings us together as one with him and with each other. We receive the Body of Christ at Mass so that we can more faithfully be the sacrament of Christ for the world around us. To bring Jesus out to the world and be Jesus for others through our acts of charity, love, and service.

Refugee families arrive with little to no resources for establishing households during their first few months of resettlement. Journey's End relies heavily on donations from the community to provide these families with essential home furnishings and other household items like toiletries and cleaning supplies.

The Ablaze Adult Ministry was happy to help such an important cause. Jesus accepted everyone, no matter their background, status, and physical ailments. To think of God's people being treated lesser than is what motivated this act of love. We are put on this earth to live as a Disciple of Christ and be an example for others.

Empathy is defined as the ability to understand and share the feelings of another. In this world with social media and affluence in most countries, people have become numb to the feeling of empathy. They are too busy worrying about themselves, their follower count, their next big scheme to get rich.



The desire to help someone who is poor and in need goes unrecognized. Empathy is what this world needs. Put yourself in the shoes of the homeless person on the street. Put yourself in the shoes of the refugee family who packed a bag and left their home because they felt threatened or could not provide for their families.

It does not matter what the politicians say, it does not matter what other people think or society; what matters is what Jesus would do. He would heal the blind man, befriend the poor and lowly whom no one else respected. He would love the rich and the poor. Jesus would love you no matter your story. Ablaze will continue to volunteer and help those in need.

<u>The Academies at St. Mary's High School Gears Up for Year Two</u> In an ongoing effort to innovate and advance St. Mary's college-preparatory curriculum, The Academies at St. Mary's High School began last year, and after some tweaking, will hit the ground running in the Fall.

This pioneering initiative allows students to participate in focused areas of study with the end goal of them achieving a deeper understanding of the potential career paths and majors that colleges and universities offer. Freshmen and seniors will automatically be enrolled in The Academy of The First Year and College 101 respectively for half a term, giving them the tools to succeed in each of their new chapters.

The Academies at St. Mary's High School will include: Law, Criminal Justice, Event Planning, Finance, Entrepreneurship, Health Science Professionals, Engineering, Content Creation, Global Citizenship, Education

The Academies will be taught by the St. Mary's faculty, under the guidance of the Dean of Academic Affairs, Mr. Keith Junik, and enhanced by adjunct professors and guest lecturers, including professionals from the school's passionate alumni base, parents, and local and national experts in their fields. The Academies will meet twice weekly for 40 minutes and co-exist with the gold-standard New York State Regents Curriculum and Lancer Life Curriculum currently offered at St. Mary's. St. Mary's High School currently ranks seventh in Buffalo Business First's rankings of 131 high schools in Western New York.

"We are always trying to be innovative and creative when it comes to our curriculum," said Dean of Academic Affairs, Keith Junik. "A few years ago, we instituted the Lancer Life Curriculum, which mandates students take courses that teach important life skills, like public speaking, leadership, personal finance, and our award-winning senior portfolio capstone project. The Academies at St. Mary's High School takes that initiative even further, giving our students a real advantage as they head off to college, already having a background in majors they may want to pursue or crossing things off the list they're no longer interested in," Junik concluded.

"It is the overall student experience and the desire to make it a rewarding, positive, and practical one that motivates the Administration at St. Mary's High School," said Head of School, Kevin Kelleher. We're looking forward to continuing to develop The Academies Program at St. Mary's High School into an academic tradition of unparalleled excellence," Kelleher said.
